Dear Friends in Christ,

I have talked to a few people lately who have mentioned feelings of "burnout". People are feeling a weariness of life in a world that seems out of control. Listening to the news is overwhelming. Dealing with conflict and with angry people is exhausting. Facing the frustration of failure and brokenness is exasperating.

How much simpler it is to just retreat from life and focus on our own personal happiness and ignore the world, ignore our neighbors, and ignore God! Burnout tempts us to just click on the next internet link and watch the next escapist video or TV show and just stop thinking and feeling. We have all felt a least a little burnout at one time or another.

There is help and healing found in simplifying one's life and letting go of over-commitment. Paying attention to your own body, mind, and heart, and taking care of one's mental and physical health are vital. Too much of our frantic pace of life is an effort to run away from emptiness in our souls. It is good to be still and to listen to the still small voice in our own souls.

But isolating and numbing oneself with entertainment or alcohol or other addictive behavior is not the answer to our burnout. The answer is right there in the Ten Commandments: "Remember the Sabbath." Remember the need for a regular sabbatical, a step away from our regular routine and from the demands of productivity, to tend to the soul that God has placed within us. Sabbath is about getting back to the basics and simplifying life. Sabbath is about remembering the bigger story that gives meaning and hope to our individual life stories.

It is good to take some vacation time away from home and from the regular routines. Unfortunately, too often I have crammed too much driving and too much activity into my vacations. What we really need is time to slow down, to reflect, to have deeper conversations with people who matter to us. We also need time to get out in nature and walk and smell the roses. Some of my best vacations have been family camp weeks at Okoboji.

And each week, there is need for time to focus on the Big Story, God's Story. Sometimes worship can seem like just one more demand, one more expectation that we are too weary to maintain, especially for those who have young children. And yet, the regular discipline of just showing up and asking God to speak to us through songs, Scripture, sermon, and fellowship is therapeutic. God's Word is healing -- not like a magic pill, but like a regular dose of medicine that slowly heals one's heart and mind.

Immanuel wants to be here for you. We want to invite you to share in some sabbatical time every week. Singing is good low-impact cardiac, mental, and spiritual exercise. Scripture is effective often in ways we don't even realize. Prayer is letting go of our anxiety and entrusting it to God. Smiles from our neighbors are contagious. And sharing your time with others is uplifting.

A Lutheran theologian called worship a royal waste of time. What she meant was that worship is time when we stop the rat race and come to our King and remember that we are not justified by our doing but simply by our being – being a child of God.

# MAY AND JUNE COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARIES

The Immanuel Church Council met May 10 with 10 of 12 members present. Pastor Phil shared devotions. Council met with Heidi Thies and 2 other members about the Music Director position. Heidi asked the council to explain their views on her employment. Later on, Heidi Thies submitted her resignation. Derek Chapman also resigned from the council.

The Council met June 14 with 9 of 11 members present. Steve Allen led devotions from John 7:24 where Jesus says, "Stop judging my mere appearances and instead judge correctly." John Taggs will lead devotions in July.

Vicki Strissel, Steve Allen, Scott Shannon, John Taggs, and Eric Chipman volunteered to take Sunday Council duties.

**Treasurer's Report-** May YTD income is \$118,515 and expenses are \$107,505. General Fund stands at \$87,552 including about \$26,000 of the Ted Williams bequest. The Building Fund is at \$58,900.

**Worship/Evangelism** – Plans to rent a digital organ for trial use for a month. Council directed the committee to find people to fill various music positions at Immanuel.

**Fellowship/Education** – VBS is being planned for last week of July. Neither Okoboji nor Riverside has enough staff this summer to offer us a day camp team. We will run our VBS with our own volunteers. Pastor is heading it up with help from Becky Chipman, DeAnn Nielsen, and Donna Nelson.

**Outreach/Stewardship** – 441 pounds for the food pantry so far. May Mission Partner was one of our main LCMC seminaries (Institute of Lutheran Theology). June Mission Partner is West Central Community Action. We are not planning to staff the Community Kitchen Christmas meal this year.

**Property** – Hinges are worn out on front doors causing them to sag. Will look into replacements.

**Executive** – Presented a first draft of an Employee Handbook. John Taggs was appointed to recruit someone to fill out the year on council for Derek Chapman.

**Pastor's Report –** Recommended Marty Burchett, Colin and Roberta King (Camden and Raina), and Richard and Barb Furst for membership at Immanuel.

**OLD BUSINESS:** *Fall Retreat:* After discussion it was decided the local ministry to receive 50% of the offering from the September retreat would be Shelby County Community Outreach. Tanzania would also receive 50% of the offering. Guests will be asked to bring a donation of items to send to Tanzania. Items such as reading (cheater) glasses, flash cards or jump ropes were suggestions. Items not liquid or perishable are needed. Program volunteers are in place and the menu was decided. There will be sign up sheets in August for donations of bars and other items to complete the luncheon menu. ### WOW GATHERING

Linda treated 16 attendees to a "tea party" complete with beautifully decorated tables and china and served many delicious sweet breads, fruit dish and of course tea. Her program was on "8 Oldest Quilt Patterns in History" with origins back to 3400 BC. She displayed quilts of each of the first 8 patterns. From oldest: #1 "crazy quilt" not really a pattern-just random stitching together of what scraps were available. First found in Egyptian tombs and Europe pre-17<sup>th</sup> century. Gained popularity in Centennial of 1876. #2 Rose of Sharon-American. #3 Eight-Pointed Star-origin France-early 18<sup>th</sup> century. #4 Friendship Quilt-early 19th century-origin New England. Often made in secret and signed by loved ones to be given to a special person. #5 Nine Patch-origin American in early 19<sup>th</sup> century. Very common utility guilt. #6 Pinwheel-origin American west-depicts windmills seen along the trail traveling west. #7 Log Cabin-origin English/Irish. Strips resemble logs--meaningful to traveling pioneers and seeing the center square (usually red) was a reminder of home, warmth and security. #8 Dresden Plate-German origin early 20<sup>th</sup> century-inspired by porcelain plates produced in city of Dresden. A few of the quilts on display were considered "summer quilts" as they were just the front and a backing having no inner batting or other fabric between-lighter weight for the summer heat. Thanks to Linda for the time spent in having such a special gathering. It was greatly enjoyed by all. We closed with the Lord's Prayer. NO WOW IN JULY! Imagine not being able to turn on your faucet to get clean drinking water. Next, imagine not even having a well to go to for <u>any</u> water, but instead you must walk to the nearest "watering hole' and bucket it back to your home. (Also keep in mind that this water is probably not "clean" drinking water.)

With this in mind, members of our congregation have recently been led to generously contribute to a NEW well project.

It takes \$10,000 to dig a well. To date, donations for a <u>new</u> well stands at \$6,520. If you would like to advance the drill further please mark funds to "Tanzania Well Project".
