Dear Friends in Christ.



Last month a couple of us joined over 600 of our LCMC family at the 2023 Annual Gathering. The gathering theme focused on what has been called "LCMC 3.0." If LCMC 1.0 was the founding decade and LCMC 2.0 was the decade of rapid growth, LCMC 3.0 seems to be a focus on learning to care for one another in Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ.

One of our 4 LCMC core values is being "accountable to one another." I always thought that was a reference to discipline for wayward pastors and congregations. More importantly it is a call to encourage and care for one another within this association. As LCMC congregations, we should get to know our LCMC neighbors so that we can be there for one another through the challenges of being the Church in this world. LCMC hopes to encourage this by focusing on helping new LCMC congregations learn about LCMC, developing and caring for leaders, and strengthening our districts/fellowships within LCMC.

One of the highlights of the gathering was Ed Stetzer's entertaining and enlightening keynote address on our current cultural crisis. Stetzer described 6 cultural convulsions we have faced recently and are currently facing: disease (covid), distrust, toxic social media, a mental health implosion, identity disorientation, and divisions in the church. Traditional Christian ethics used to be a majority view in our society. Now traditional Christian ethics are the minority view as nominal Christians now share many values with unbelievers rather than with convictional Christians. In other words, the Church has lost its home field advantage in our society. In some settings there are clear disadvantages to being a Christian. But there are reasons to be hopeful. The cultural convulsion of the late 1960s gave birth to a spiritual renewal in the 1970s as young people realized the emptiness of the false hopes of the 1960s.

I also enjoyed some great presentations by Julie Smith of our LCMC staff. In a breakout session, Julie spoke on Lutheran preaching. Every Lutheran preacher needs to remember 2 important things before preaching. First, the congregation is made up of people who are in bondage to sin and cannot free themselves, and second, the preacher is called to preach the gospel that sets them free. In a keynote, she spoke on "The Mission Is Simple but the Process Is Messy." The mission is simple: speak and do the Gospel that sets people free (Word and Sacrament). The process to do that can be tedious and difficult. LCMC invites people to get out of the infant car seat complete with snacks and videos and to take the keys and get into the driver's seat and drive the church. LCMC is a call to get involved and do the messy work of making the Church what it is supposed to be instead of paying a church bureaucracy to do it for us.

I appreciate the opportunity to go to the LCMC gathering each year to connect with our LCMC

family and our mission partners around the world.



OCTOBER COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY

The Immanuel Church Council met October 10 with 9 of 13 members present.

John Taggs led devotions about the power of lies and the healing power of forgiveness. Steve Allen will lead November devotions.

Treasurer: October income was \$19,854 and expenses were \$21,082. General Fund balance on October 1 was \$76,383 which is over \$25,000 ahead of last year. Capital Savings Account is at \$64,080. Organ Fund is at \$28,272.53. TZ Account is at \$32,209.

Worship/Evangelism: The balcony platform project is in progress. An organ dedication is tentatively scheduled for February 11 with a guest organist from Omaha Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. Still needing a handbell director. Needing new sound and camera tech team members. Considering doing some sponsorships on KNOD. Wondering if many people listen to KNOD.

Fellowship/Education: Hosted Homecoming Sunday program and tailgate party. Reserved Okoboji staff for VBS July 22-25. LYO has set a fall schedule of activities.

Outreach/Stewardship: Our November Mission partners are Open Door Mission in Omaha and Lutheran World Relief. Food pantry donations are at 894 pounds. The Sharing Cupboard is regularly stocked and frequently empty. We have \$7500 toward another well. Cost is about \$1200. A Gratitude Sunday is being planned for November. Members are invited to give gifts designated for future production of "The Chosen".

Property: The balcony platform project is in progress. Organ is on schedule for installation in December.

Executive: Working on employee reviews. Offering envelopes will be ordered without names and addresses to ensure that we get them in time this year. We will put a name label on the boxes.

Pastor's Report: Transfer of Lee Gittins to Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Denison. A parent has asked about a 2nd grader joining the first Communion class. Council approved.
