
## **IMMANUEL'S INSIGHTS**

# Tanzania Happenings



Throughout the trip we had many great conversations and meetings. We spoke with primary and secondary school headmasters about their schools, our educational projects and the needs surrounding them. We addressed the administration of the Kidugala Lutheran Seminary, the highly respected secondary school that students from all over Tanzania attend but very few from Kidugala. They reiterated their thanks for bringing good water to their school and for supporting 6 bright students into the seminary with scholarships in a new educational project started this year. We visited with them about their new alumni program and their plans for the future of the seminary. We also visited with the leadership of the Kidugala Bible School, which is a highly rated school teaching pastors and evangelists for service in the Gospel. It was a great discussion centered mainly on the need to train more evangelists to serve in the kingdom. We met with the Kidugala evangelists which is always a highlight for the travelers. That is where we get a chance to speak of the community and preaching point needs. Many items were discussed including water needs, evangelists training, vocational training, possible modifications to educational support programs that we have had in place for over a decade plus new projects to name just a few of the discussions.

We only had a chance to visit the last two wells that were drilled by Immanuel and friends. All involved wanted us to send many thanks back to Immanuel. There certainly is still need for water with the Bible school being probably the location with the biggest need.

We traveled to Palangavanu where we met with a former pastor of Kidugala, Pastor Sebastian. We visited their school for students with disabilities and enjoyed hearing about their hopes of the future expanding that service to handle children of disabilities to a wider community. It was a great conversation.

We ventured to Njombe which is a regular event to do a bit of shopping for items for the TZ auction held each winter and visit the bishop. One might think the trip to the bishop would be a bit dry, but he loves Immanuel and what Immanuel is doing in the southern diocese of Tanzania, so the conversation is quite entertaining.

The second to the last meeting that we had was with HEKEMA (the microloan SOCCOS) and the Kidugala AMCOS (the cooperative organization). HEKEMA is doing well and quite active, but AMCOS is struggling. This is concerning to see this struggle since in 2010 Immanuel was instrumental in bringing Iringa Hope (which the SOCCOS and AMCOS are a part of) to Kidugala and in 2019 Immanuel helped bring Iringa Hope to the southern TZ diocese. We have reached out to the former manager of Iringa Hope who did a great job and asked her to help us identify any weaknesses and to strategize how they may be addressed to get them thriving again.

The last get together was a farewell with Pastor Wallace (the superintendent of the Seminary and Bible school and the person who manages our well drilling projects on that end) and his leadership team. This get together had a lot of laughs and gift giving. The next morning, we were ready to leave Kidugala at 3:00 AM. A short night, but a great trip. It was good to meet friends, pray with them, collaborate on projects and share life in Christ together. The people of Kidugala and Immanuel's Tanzania Committee are so thankful for the support that members and friends of Immanuel have given this fruitful international mission in enhancing the life and faith of those involved at both ends. The Gospel is spread as we work together as one.

#### **IMMANUEL'S INSIGHTS**



Dear Friends in Christ,

I am grateful to you for allowing me to travel to Ethiopia and Tanzania this past month. And I thank the Danish Dolls for paying for my airfare with proceeds from the Aebelskiver Dinners.

The trip to Ethiopia didn't go exactly as planned as we were unable to get permission to enter the refugee camps. We were, however, able to meet with 19 Mabaan people who live in the refugee camps in Ethiopia near the border of South Sudan. We were able to ask questions and hear them talk about what live in the camps if like. We were also able to share our hopes for our relationship with those in the camps.

The elders who met with us expressed their gratitude for our interest in providing food assistance. They were clearly very happy that someone from America was taking interest in their lives. They feel stuck between their homeland which is in the midst of violent political conflict and the rest of the world which seems to have no place for them. Some have been able to escape the camps, but those exits are not very open right now.

Ethiopia, the United Nations, and NGOs (non-governmental organizations) are trying to provide some assistance to the refugees, but it is not enough. Monthly food rations last only two weeks and sometimes come late. A doctor writes prescriptions, but there is no medicine available in the camp and no money to buy medications from the nearest town. There are schools, but the teachers aren't well trained. There is farmland, but no money to rent it and buy seed and no legal guarantee that the refugees can actually harvest what they grow. There is water to drink, but it is river water and not very safe to drink.

What we are giving is just a small gesture of support. There are well over 20,000 people in these two camps. But it is possible that we are the only Church doing anything for them at this point. Having met the leaders who are trying to help us bring food to the hungry in these camps, I trust that they will do the best that they can. But there is no way we can satisfy all who are hungry feel satisfied with only \$1000 worth of food each month.

I am very grateful to all who have donated toward our refugee food aid fund. We have received over \$11,000 this year. We will be sending \$1000 each month and maybe more going forward as we assess the income to the fund. It is a small gesture, but it is also a gesture of hope. The hope is that our Mabaan friends in the camps can work with the Ethiopian government and some NGOs so that we can also supply funds that will support the drilling of wells and the renting and farming of land.

It seems to me that the Holy Spirit has called us to this work of compassion. Compassion is a blessing both to those who receive it and to those who give it. I pray that this relationship will be a blessing to us all.





#### Tax-Efficient Charitable Giving Strategies Based on Your Age

Depending on your age and the types of accounts you hold, there are several ways to maximize the impact of your charitable giving while minimizing your tax burden. Here are three key strategies to consider:

#### 1. If you are under age 70½ and have appreciated investments

Strategy: Donate appreciated securities from a taxable brokerage account directly to the charity without cashing them out.

#### Advantages:

• By donating long-term appreciated investments directly to a qualified charity, you avoid paying capital gains tax on the appreciation.

If you itemize deductions, you can deduct the full fair market value of the donated asset (up to 30% of your adjusted gross income).

#### 2. If you are over age 70½ and eligible for Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)

Strategy: Make Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) directly from an IRA.

#### Advantages:

- QCDs (up to \$108,000 per year per person) are not included in your taxable income.
- QCDs reduce your adjusted gross income which can lead to fewer taxes on Social Security benefits and lower Medicare premiums.

You get the tax benefit even if you take the standard deduction.

Ideal for: IRA owners over age 70½ who want a simple, tax-efficient way to give to charity.

#### 3. If you are RMD age and must take Required Minimum Distributions from your IRA

Strategy: Use QCDs to satisfy all or part of your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD).

#### Advantage:

QCDs count toward your RMD but are not taxed, unlike regular RMDs.

Ideal for: Retirees subject to RMDs looking to reduce taxes while giving generously.

Note: Beginning in the 2026 tax year, the IRS will allow non-itemizers to deduct cash/check donations to charity up to \$1000 for single filers and \$2000 for couples filing jointly.

These strategies require careful planning and timely execution—especially QCDs, which must go directly from your IRA to the charity to qualify. Talk with your financial advisor or tax professional to see which approach fits best with your goals. **Treasurer's Report**: July income was \$24,981 and expenses were \$18,480 for a gain of \$6,501. YTD income is \$177,630 and expenses are \$165,851 for a gain of \$11,779. General Fund balance is \$84,241 plus \$25,000 totaling \$109,241 and the Capital Savings balance is at \$83,167. Tanzania Account is at \$66,365. \$11,573 has been donated for refugee food.

**Executive** – It was suggested that we could install a key pad entry door by the kitchen so that we would not need to loan out so many outside door keys.

### **Fall Educational Programs**




